What is AACY?

American Association of Caregiving Youth (AACY)

- Florida based non-profit corporation
- Established in 1998
- The only organization in the US dedicated solely to addressing caregiving youth issues
- Established the Caregiving Youth Institute in 2014



Caregiving Youth Project (CYP)

- Established in 2006 by AACY
- Addresses the needs of pre-teens, teens, families, and professionals through education, awareness, research and direct services
- Brings together healthcare, education, and the community
- Works in partnership with school districts



Who are the Caregiving Youth?

♥ Children & adolescents <18 years of age who provide significant assistance to relatives or household members who need help due to:



At least 1.4 million caregiving youth, ages 8 to 18, exist nationwide as of 2005





The Impact on Caregiving Youth

Caregiving Youth spend an average of 20 hours a week caring for loved ones



They sacrifice their education, physical and emotional well-being



They become isolated from friends & lack socialization



They miss experiencing their own childhood



CYP: Focused on Making a Difference





Economic Impact of CYP 2013-14

CYP Investment per Student/Year	
Total students in CYP 2013-2014	550
Cost per student	\$766.39 / year
Total Annual Investment	\$421,515/ year
95% graduation rate for existing CYP students	523 graduates
Additional annual income of high school grads compared with non grads	\$10,000 per year


Ultimately just these 523 grads from CYP will collectively impact the economy with >\$5.2M average / year!

This represents a return of 12 x investment!




Funding and Resources Needed


- CYP includes direct and indirect support services in school, out of school and at home
- <10% Administrative overhead</p>
- **♥** \$766.39 Average investment per CYP student/year
